CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



Drugs Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

Drug Possession Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non- criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

Operational 2 Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

Other Criminal Code Violations The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

Property Crime Violations This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

Statutes & Acts Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

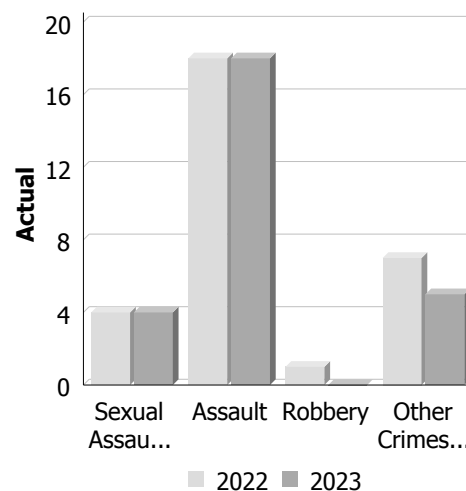
Traffic Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

Violent Crimes The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

COMMUNITY SAFETY / MEDIA RELATIONS - MARCH / APRIL 2023

OBJECTIVES OF THE CSO / MEDIA RELATIONS

- Distribute media releases in relation to the BIG4 corporately driven driving behaviours; impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving and lack of seatbelt use.
- Seek community involvement by utilizing media releases with regard to property crimes such as break and enter, theft, mischief, drugs and wanted persons; with proven success.
- Engage with community partners to deliver educational programs on topics such as fraud, internet safety, youth and the law and drug awareness.
- Work collaboratively with the Lambton Crime Unit, Community Street Crimes Unit, Operational Analyst and Sarnia-Lambton Crime Stoppers.
- Use social media to help promote upcoming OPP events
- Work closely with the Auxiliary Unit to assist in any upcoming events

NUMBER OF TARGETED MEDIA RELEASES:

A total of **39 media releases** were distributed for the month of **March**.

A total of **18 media releases** were distributed for the month of **April**.

PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:

- The month of March is designated as Fraud Prevention month and, as such, a social media post was added about home renovation frauds.
- The CSO attended Farm Safety Day on March 25th at Podolinsky Farm Equipment dealership to speak about cycling, boating and ATV safety.
- The CSO has conducted detachment tours for local cubs/beavers/scouts groups in both Petrolia and Corunna.
- The CSO attended Walpole Island Elementary school for a Kids Safety event on April 26th
- The CSO assisted with a well-attended recruiting seminar in Petrolia on Mar 23rd held at the YMCA.

OTHER NEWS:

- The Lambton CSO has been providing content to the Sarnia Lambton Crime Stoppers to showcase crime in the area with their "Crime of the Week" segment both on the SLCS website and radio broadcasts weekly.

- The Lambton CSO has been actively building and improving relationships with local, regional and international news outlets through email correspondence and phone interviews.
- Social media posts were created after a child went missing from a home on Hickory Creek line. The posts were updated when the child was located safe.
- A media release was posted regarding the 49th anniversary of the death of Karen Caughlin. The ongoing plea to the public for information was conveyed.
- A media conference for the release of Project Lifesaver equipment, new to Sarnia-Lambton, was held on March 14 in collaboration with Sarnia Police Service and Sarnia Lambton Victim Services.
- The CSO attended the 'Hoops for Charity' basketball game in Forest where members of Lambton OPP took on students from NLSS. Social media posts were created to advertise the event as well as ongoing updates during the game.
- With the addition of the new In Car Cameras, multiple social media posts were created to advise the public of ongoing concerns with expired or unexpired vehicle plates.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS – MARCH / APRIL 2023

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during March and April. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SRO also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety.

The SRO assisted many of the counties primary grade schools as well during this period regarding youth bullying issues and social media awareness discussions.

MARCH 2023

- Corunna- A 17-year-old youth is being investigated for distributing intimate images without consent. Investigation is ongoing currently.
- Forest- a 16 year old youth was seen smashing a window. The youth was diverted to the Sarnia Lambton Rebound program.
- Petrolia – A 14-year-old with a violent history pulled a knife on a fellow youth and made a threat. The youth was arrested and held for a bail hearing due to public safety concerns. The youth was released by the courts the following day with conditions.
- Petrolia – A white powder substance with a plastic straw was left in the bathroom at the Petrolia High School during school hours. This occurrence was investigated, and it appears to be a prank. Due to the location of the substance police were unable to determine who conducted the prank.
- Petrolia – Four youths have been stealing eggs from the community fridge and then “egging” houses in Petrolia. At this point in time the youth have been identified as person interest only.
- Petrolia - Two 14-year-old youths were caught shoplifting. The store owner did not want charges. Trespass orders were put in place for those youths to no longer attend the store.
- Petrolia – A 12-year-old student lifted a chair over his head and threatened persons within his reach. The student has been removed from the school and ongoing mental health help has been provided for this student.
- Petrolia – A 13-year-old youth assaulted a worker that was supervising him. The youth has had previous police occurrences. The youth was charged with assault and has a court appearance scheduled.
- Petrolia – A 13-year-old youth assaulted one of the female crossing guards striking her several times. There were no injuries reported by the crossing guard. The youth was diverted to the Rebound program.

- For the month of March, there were 8 occurrences relating to mental health involving youths ranging from ages 10-16 years.
- There were 3 motor vehicle collisions occurrences during the month of March involving all youths 17 years of age.
- Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 3 youths being warned under the HTA/CAIA while 4 youths were issued Provincial Offence Notices under the HTA.

APRIL 2023

- Forest- School Principal reporting 3rd hand information on behalf of classroom teacher. Information disclosed that 13-yr-old female student may have been sending/receiving inappropriate messages/photos with another youth, possibly a u/k male through Roblox and Snapchat apps. Police investigated; interviews completed. Insufficient evidence to proceed with investigation. Youth referred to community program voluntary.
- Ongoing issues between two male youths. Verbal argument ensued on the side of the road. Both parties were warned by Police for instigating a fight. Parents/Guardian were notified.
- Principal of local high school called and advised that a 15-year-old youth/student threatened his ex-girlfriend and shoved her in the hall. The incident was captured on video at the school. The male was arrested and charged. The youth was subsequently assessed by Lambton OPP MCRT team. Youth released and turned over to his parents. Incident cleared by charge.
- Watford- Complainant advising there was an altercation between her son (12) and another male (13) from his school last night. Youth was reported to have a knife on his person with the intent to intimidate and destroy her son's bag of chips. Police investigated. All youths and parents spoken to. The suspect youth was verbally warned by Police.
- Petrolia-Two youths' ages 17, were found on video to be rummaging through a vehicle's toolbox. The youths took the items out and threw them in the box of the truck. The youths took a tube of automotive paste and smeared it on the vehicle. All youths were diverted by Police.
- Female student (16) from a local high school angry about being picked on because she identifies as a "Furry". Female gets very angry and makes utterances that she wants them to burn and that she may light a fire. Lambton OPP MCRT supports delivered. Female states she has no intent to light a fire, that the words spoken were out of anger only.
- Female student (16) from a local high school attended the office to speak to the school resource officer, to advise that her stepdad and dad had sexually assaulted her. Lambton OPP Crime unit engaged. After further investigation, no evidence to support a criminal offence. Supports offered.

- Male youth (15) sexually assaulted on multiple occasions a 12-year-old female. Lambton OPP Crime unit engaged. Charges pending.
- Plympton-Wyoming – Threats complaint between two youths ages 16 and 17. Comments deemed to have been said out of frustration. Male youth diverted by Police by means of a verbal warning.
- Complainant reporting group of teens causing issues in the area yelling at his residence. One male youth threatened to kill him and slit his dog's throat. Through Police investigation, the youths were unable to be identified. The complainant does not fear for his safety.
- Complainant (17) advised he accidentally discharged a BB Gun towards his friend (16) and hit him in the ear. EMS advised that the BB appeared to be lodged in males ear canal but does not appear to be life threatening. Investigation determined unintentional discharge. Parents notified and BB gun discarded by the complainant's mother.
- BRIGDEN-Male (22) assaults 16-year-old female, reported to be an ex-girlfriend. No injuries reported. After further Police investigation, male charged accordingly.
- For the month of April, there were 6 occurrences relating to mental health/suicidal ideations, all involving youths ages 13-17 years.
- There were 6 motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of April, involving youths ages 16-17 years of age.
- Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 12 youths being warned and 13 Provincial Offence Notices given under the Highway Traffic Act. Youths ranged from 16-18 years of age.



COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT – MARCH / APRIL 2023

During the months of March / April 2023 Lambton CSCU investigated **16** occurrences.

Lambton CSCU members laid a total of **110** charges.

- Lambton CSCU wrote 9 warrants for a drug trafficking and property related investigations. The unit completed 4 warrant service entries.
- Lambton CSCU executed S.11 CDSA Search Warrant Lambton County residence.
 - Persons Arrested: 2
 - Charges: 5
 - Seized: 130 grams of Cocaine, 34 Oxy's (pills), 11 Hydromorphone pills, drug trafficking indicia.
 - Total value of seizure \$14,500.
 - Various charges related to drug trafficking, weapons, stolen property.
- Lambton CSCU officer observed suspicious vehicle while on surveillance. Investigation revealed stolen motor vehicle.
 - Persons Arrested: 2
 - Charges: 29
 - Seized: 120.9 grams of Cocaine, 49 grams of Methamphetamine, 1.4 grams of Fentanyl, 35 Hydromorphone pills, 64 Oxy's (pills).
 - Total seizure \$34,040.
- Lambton CSCU executed a S.487 Search Warrant at a residence on Walpole Island.
 - Persons Arrested: 2
 - Charges: 44
 - Seized: 6 long guns and lots of ammunition, small amount of drugs.
- Lambton CSCU executed a S.487 and S.11 Search Warrant at a residence on Walpole Island.
 - Persons Arrested: 3
 - Charges: 28
 - Seized: 5 firearms (2 sawed off shotguns), 14.2 grams of Fentanyl, 9 grams of Methamphetamine, 13 Percocet's, \$2410 in Cash, stolen property.
 - Total seizure \$10,520.
- Former CSCU member conducted traffic stop on Hwy 40 – resulted in 1 male arrested, 7 charges, seized 107.8 grams of Cocaine, 55.8 grams of Fentanyl, 58.4 grams of Methamphetamine. Lambton CSCU processed all drug and wrote warrants furthering the investigation.
- Lambton CSCU assisted other units with warrant entries – in Essex County.
- Lambton CSCU assisted in the investigation of overdose death investigation.
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis.

MAJOR CRIME UNIT – MARCH / APRIL 2023

MARCH 2023

- Crime Unit members involved in grandparent scam with over \$100 000 lost. Investigation continuing. Grandparent Schemes seem to be ongoing.
- Crime members and OPP Criminal Investigations Branch still investigating Andrew CHUTE homicide at the Marthaville Conservation Area.
- Crime members and CIB actively investigating an unsolved homicide of David Oliver on the Kettle & Stoney Point First Nation.
- Nine non-suspicious death investigations completed.
- Three reported sexual assaults cases investigated.

APRIL 2023

- Six sexual assaults cases investigated.
- Four sudden deaths investigated, one being a suspected drug overdose death.
- Crime Unit is involved in a multi-jurisdictional homicide. Case files being disclosed to the crown attorney through multiple rounds.
- Crime Unit continues to investigate missing female, Deana Timms.

A vehicle with an unlocked door or an open window is an easy target. Protect your vehicle from theft. Always roll up your vehicle's windows, lock the doors, and pocket the keys when you park your car. Park in a well-lit area and never leave valuables in plain view.

Never leave your vehicle unattended while it is running.

If you have a garage, use it and lock the door as well as your vehicle.

Give only your ignition key to a parking lot attendant.

Keep all other keys with you.

Keep your vehicle registration certificate and proof of insurance on you at all times. Don't leave these documents in the glove compartment.

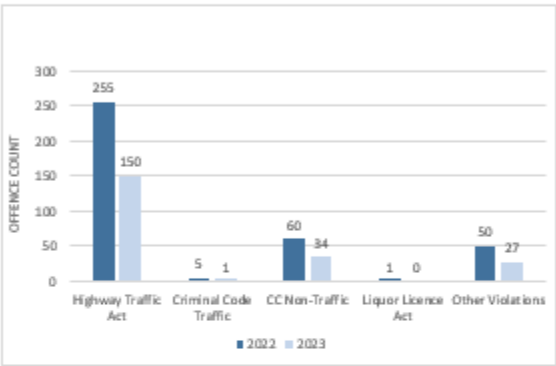

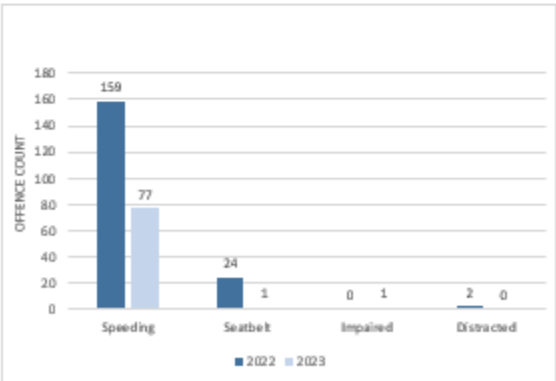

9-1-1 EMERGENCY If you call 9-1-1 for an emergency:

- ✓ Give your exact location. Include address and town or city as this will enable call taker to either handle
- ✓ The information or transfer you to the proper 9-1-1 centre.
- ✓ Give your telephone number including the area code.
- ✓ Advise the nature of your call.
- ✓ Listen to the call takers instructions - depending on the location and type of incident, you may be transferred.
- ✓ Stay on the line until advised to hang up.

CALLING INTO THE DETACHMENT:

- ✓ When calling the detachment at the above numbers you will receive an automated greeting.
- ✓ **Press 1** if you need to report an incident or speak with an officer dial 1-88-310-1122.
- ✓ **Press 2** if you wish to speak with the administrative personnel during the above noted business hours. After hours you may leave a non-urgent message that will be followed-up on the next business day. Do not leave a request for assistance message.

OUTSIDE PHONE * If you attend an office and the doors are locked or it is after hours – please pick up the phone outside of the detachment and you will be connected directly to the OPP Communications Centre.

CANADIAN ANTI-FRAUD CENTRE:

The Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC) is the central agency in Canada that collects information and criminal intelligence on such matters as mass marketing fraud (i.e.: telemarketing), advance fee fraud (i.e.: West African letters), Internet fraud and identification theft complaints.

FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.

CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:

The OPP's Citizen Self Reporting system allows you to submit a report from your computer or mobile device without going to an OPP detachment. All submissions will be sent directly to the OPP and reviewed by an officer. You may be contacted to provide more information. You must have a valid e-mail address in order to submit a report.

Use this system to report:

- Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
- Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
- Theft under \$5,000
- Driving Complaint

DO NOT use this system:

- If the occurrence is an emergency
- If the occurrence happened outside of OPP jurisdiction
- If there are any identifiable suspects
- If anyone was injured
- If the occurrence involves a weapon
- If the occurrence involves any damage to a motor vehicle due to an actual or apparent collision, including fail to remain collisions
- If the occurrence involves a break and enter to a place (e.g. unlawful entry and theft from a house, a building or a structure)
- If the occurrence involves drugs or gambling (including lottery tickets)
- If the occurrence involves a passport

ONLINE CRIMINAL RECORD CHECKS

OPP record check applications — including payment and ID verification — are now online at www.opp.ca. Your identity will be verified using [Electronic Identity Verification](#) (EIV). The majority of applicants will not be required to attend an OPP detachment ([see exceptions](#)). The application process is quick, easy and secure.

Follow these four steps to prepare to apply.

Step 1: Confirm that you live in an OPP-policed community

To request an OPP Record Check, you must live in an OPP-policed community.

The OPP is not the police service of jurisdiction for large urban centres including Ottawa, Toronto, the Greater Toronto Area (GTA), Hamilton, Niagara, Sudbury or Thunder Bay. If you live in these communities, please contact your local police service of jurisdiction to request a police record check. Do not select OPP Highway Safety Divisions (Cambridge, Mississauga, Toronto, Niagara and Burlington) as record checks for individuals who live in these communities must be completed by the local police service.

Step 2: Identify which type of record check you need

During your online application, you will be required to select the type of police record check you need. The agency/organization requesting the check will communicate to you which type of check you need. The OPP cannot make this decision for you.

The OPP provides four types of [record checks](#), including:

- Criminal Record Check (CRC)
- Criminal Record and Judicial Matters Check (CRJMC)
- Vulnerable Sector Check (VSC)
- OPP Non-Parent Custody Check (LE213)

If your agency letter states that you require a Criminal Record Check with a Vulnerable Sector Check, you only need to request a Vulnerable Sector Check.

Step 3: Gather what you need

A few pieces of information will be required when you apply for a police record check. You will need:

- a letter from your Canadian agency/organization identifying the type(s) of checks you require.
- to be prepared to answer financial questions in order to [verify your identification](#) (as part of the EIV process).
- a credit card or pre-paid credit card available for payment
 - Record checks: \$41.00
 - Fingerprints: \$90.00
 - Volunteer checks: Free

Step 4: Get acquainted with some important information in advance

Prior to submitting your application, here are a few things you need to know:

- Please ensure that your application is accurate and complete, and that you follow the instructions carefully, as no refunds can be issued.

- If at any point during the application process you are unsure of how to proceed, please contact 1-833-909-0057 between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday for customer service.
- Unless specifically asked, please do not upload copies of your photo ID.
- In order to be compliant with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) Dissemination of Criminal Record Information Policy, the OPP is required to limit the number of times one applicant can download their results. If you download your results and do not see the file, please check your downloads folder.
- You must live in an OPP policed community to apply. If you apply for a record check and you live in a community policed by another police service, your application will not be processed, and you will not be eligible for refund.
