# CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



**Drugs** Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

**Drug Possession** Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

**Operational** calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non-criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

**Operational 2** Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

**Other Criminal Code Violations** The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

**Property Crime Violations** This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

**Statutes & Acts** Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

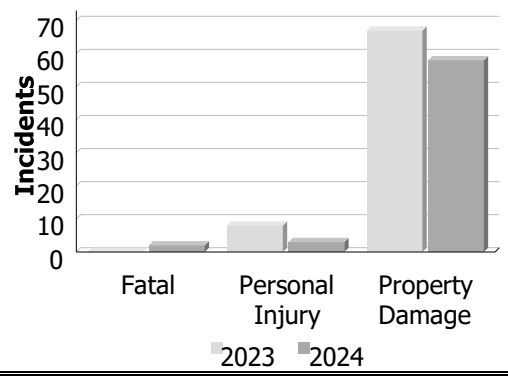
**Traffic** Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

**Violent Crimes** The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.

A total of **10 media releases** were distributed for the month of **April**.

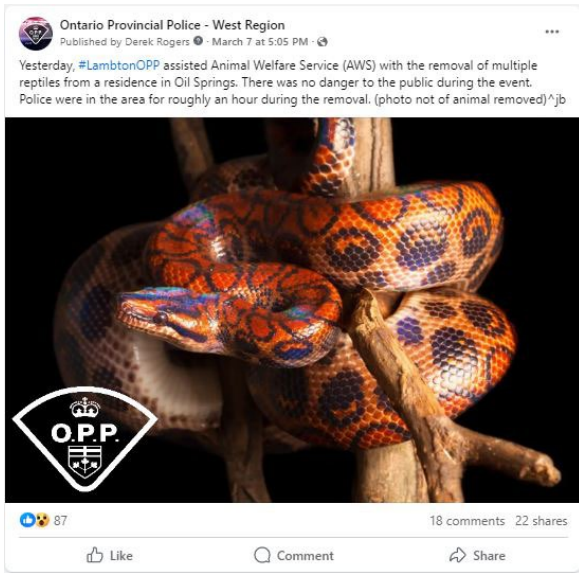
### PUBLIC EDUCATION CAMPAIGNS:

- The CSO created posts on social media in the month of March on the personal safety presentation as well as preventing 'sextortion'.

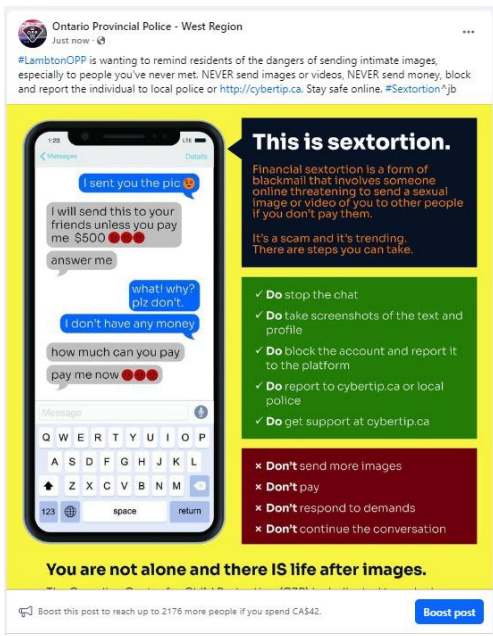
### OTHER NEWS

## SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS OVERVIEW

The School Resource Officer (SRO) continued foot and vehicle patrols inside and outside of both county secondary schools during March and April. Emphasis was placed on driving issues during the lunch periods and end of school when most driving complaints are reported.

The SROs also continued presenting in class sessions to both secondary schools with subjects including youth and the law, drug abuse, bullying, social media awareness and safety. Bike safety presentations were also presented to elementary school aged students.

### March 2024

**St Clair-** Complainant advises her 17-year-old son was struck over the head with a beer bottle by 18-year-old male. The incident was reported after the fact. Police investigated the situation, and the 18-year-old youth was arrested and charged. Proper supports were set in place for the victim.

**Watford-** Male advises police that his ex-wife and son (15-years-old) were fighting. It was reported the youth was not happy with house rules subsequently breaking a door and railing. Police attended and warned the youth for mischief and supports were offered.

**Wyoming-** Vice Principal advising a student informed her that her boyfriend 16-years-old had taken 15 anxiety pills, and stated he was sleepy. Vice Principal reached out to police requesting a wellness check. Police attended the youth's residence and spoke to the male. It was confirmed the male had not taken any pills and was not suicidal.

**Petrolia-** Male (15) from a local group home reached out to police to advise that he had been threatened by another male (17) within the home. Police attended and spoke with the complainant, and the operator of the home who advised that it was in fact the complainant who was acting aggressively. The situation was mediated, and all youth involved were spoken to by police.

Kid's Help Phone contacted Lambton OPP regarding suicidal youth (16) who had slit her wrists. Police attended the residence, and the youth was apprehended under the Mental Health Act and transported to a local hospital and formed.

Police were dispatched to a suicidal 14-year-old female who stated she was going to kill herself by taking pills. Police attended and located the youth upstairs in the bathroom where she had locked herself in. The youth was apprehended under the Metal Health Act and transported to a local hospital for further assessment.

For the month of March, there were **2** occurrences relating to mental health involving youths ranging from **14- 16** years of age.

There were **3** motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of March involving youths **17 and 18** years of age.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 8 warnings being issued to youths under the HTA/CAIA, while **6** youths were issued Provincial Offence Notices under the Highway Traffic Act.

1 youth was reported missing and subsequently located shortly after being reported.

## April 2024

**Corunna** – Mother of 14-year-old daughter called police as she is being bullied at school by her peers. The principal issued progressive disciplinary actions to all youths involved. OPP School Officer followed up and completed multiple bullying presentations within the school. Students appeared very receptive.

**Petrolia** - Caller advised that her son (16) was walking home from school for lunch when 4 males drove up beside him and yelled racial slurs and made obscene sounds. Due to having no evidence to provide to police, the caller was requesting the incident be documented only.

Lambton OPP were dispatched to Breach of Probation complaint. After further investigation by police, the 14-year-old male was arrested and charged.

**St Clair**- EMS reporting female (17) has mental health issues, threatening her brother (14) with knives. Brother and sister get involved in a consensual fight. Police attended and warned both youths. Supports provided for the family.

Mother called police to advise her 15-year-old daughter has not been home for 2 weeks. Believes she is staying out of town with a friend. Police confirmed daughter to be at a friend's house in a place of safety. Daughter refusing to live at her mother's house. Proper notifications were made by police.

**Grand Bend**- Report of several youths in variety store causing a disturbance. Police later located the vehicle and conducted a traffic stop. Cannabis and liquor observed by police readily available. Two youths 17 and 18 were passengers in the vehicle. Adult driver was charged.

**Warwick**-Heated domestic dispute called into police by a witness. Male (16) physically assaulted his 16-year-old girlfriend. Police attended. The male was arrested and charged. The male was released on conditions and is to appear before the Courts later.

For the month of February, there was 1 occurrence relating to mental health/suicidal ideations, all involving youths ages **13-17 years**.

There were **2** motor vehicle collision occurrences during the month of April, involving youths ages **16-17 years of age**.

Numerous traffic stops were conducted, resulting in 10 youths being warned and 7 Provincial Offence Notices given under the Highway Traffic Act. Youths ranged from 16-18 years of age.



# CRIME & TRAFFIC – MARCH/APRIL 2024

## AREA CRIME SERGEANT:

- Crime unit members and the OPP CIB continue to investigate the Andrew CHUTE homicide that occurred at Marthaville Conservation.
- Crime unit members and the OPP CIB continue to investigate the David OLIVER homicide that occurred on Kettle and Stony Point First Nation.
- Crime unit members continue to investigate missing person Deana TIMMS who was reported missing February 2022.
- Joint investigation into Arkona bank robbery, multi jurisdictional.
- Extensive multi jurisdictional investigation into Grogan Ford vehicle thefts/fraud
- 9 sexual assaults were investigated.
- 17 sudden death investigated, all non suspicious.
- 1 fire investigated.

## CSCU SERGEANT:

- During the months of March and April 2024 Lambton CSCU investigated 10 occurrences.
- Lambton CSCU members laid a total of 11 charges.
- Lambton CSCU wrote 12 warrants for drug trafficking and property related investigations. The unit completed 4 warrant service entries.
- Lambton CSCU commenced an investigation into the trafficking of Contraband Tobacco. Lambton CSCU engaged the Contraband Tobacco Enforcement Team and jointly both units were able to identify a male trafficking in contraband tobacco. This led to a targeted stop of a cargo van loaded with contraband tobacco. Persons arrested: 1; Charges: 4. Product Seized: Approx 1,080,000 cigarettes seized. Total Street Value of Seizure: \$270,000.
- Lambton CSCU wrote a Cannabis Act search warrant regarding an illegal marijuana store front in Lambton Shores. Lambton CSCU conducted the entry warrant and search. Person arrested: 2; Persons Charged: 2; Charges: 2; Product Seized: Dried Cannabis bud, Cannabis Edibles, Cannabis Vape pens and various other cannabis products. Total Value of Seizure: \$42,000.
- Lambton CSCU conducted a Fentanyl trafficking investigation on a dealer selling to south Lambton and Walpole Island residents. Lambton CSCU conducted a targeted stop on this trafficker. Persons arrested: 3; Persons charged: 1; Charges: 2; Product Seized: 46.2 grams of Raw Fentanyl, other drug trafficking indicia. Total Value of Seizure: \$17,880.
- Lambton CSCU assisted Essex CSCU with a warrant entry and search regarding a drug trafficking investigation.
- Lambton CSCU assisted Lambton Crime Unit with a Firearms Public Safety search warrant investigation.
- Lambton CSCU assisted Lambton uniform officers with a sexual assault investigation. A S.487 warrant was written, Lambton CSCU conducted the entry and assisted with the search of the residence and outbuildings.
- Lambton CSCU continues to offer support to frontline policing operations by taking samples of seized drugs and sending the samples to Health Canada for analysis.
- Lambton CSCU continues to share intelligence reports with neighbouring police services.

## TRAFFIC:

- During this reporting period OPP members conducted 324 traffic enforcement initiatives
- One Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty-three (1253) PON's were issued and One Thousand Four Hundred and thirty-five (1435) written warnings
- There were One Hundred and Twenty-nine (129) motor vehicle collisions
- One Hundred and Twenty-three (123) RIDE Programs were conducted
- Thirty (30) Impaired Drivers were arrested

**CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:**

You have the option to report select occurrences to the OPP from your computer or mobile device using the OPP's Citizen Self Reporting system.

Use this system to report:

1. Lost/missing property under \$5,000
2. Stolen license plates or validation stickers
3. Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
4. Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
5. Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
6. Theft under \$5,000
7. Driving Complaint

**FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):**

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
